MORE ABOUT THE NAC

Welcome to the Detroit Yacht Club. The accompanying map (Fig. 1) shows the major arteries leading into Detroit and the route to follow to reach the Club.

There will be wet sailing for all boats.

In addition to the activities listed last month for participant's families, there will also be an opportunity to go out on spectator boats.

You will recall the announcement about Fleet quotas - there are none this year. Our facilities are such that there is no need to limit the number of entries. All members of FSSA are welcome. We do urge however, that you send us your entry blank as early as possible. It is difficult to plan when we do not know the number of boats entered until the last minute. So Help Us Please — Also don't forget to check article S-V-2 of the Specifications for a list of required equipment.

The following is an explanation of towing procedures.

The NAC race course will be on Lake St. Clair. The Detroit Yacht Club is situated on the Detroit River. In order to get to the race course on time it is essential that we tow up the river and into the lake. Sailing up the river could be difficult with light winds. (Fig. 2)

At the skipper's meeting we will go over the towing procedures to be used. However, I will try to cover the subject in this article in order to give you some preliminary information.

The equipment needed: (1) a bolt to fit through the tabernacle holes (normally used for hoisting the boat into or out of the water with the bridle), (2) minimum of 50 feet of ½" dacron or equivalent line, (3) 3 foot line at least ½".

Procedure to set up for tow: (1) Boats will line up on any one of the three front docks. (Fig. 3)

Each boat will use its tow line and tie a bow line around the bolt which is in the tabernacle. The line is then lead forward and through the bow plate eye. From there it will lead forward to the next boat. (fig. 4)

Picking up the line from the boat astern you will lead to the loop which has just been made with your tow line. You will now, using the tow line from the boat astern, tie a bow line around the loop in your tow line. (Fig. 5)

With the 3 foot line you will now make a loop to keep the tow line you received away from your tiller, using the stern ring, as shown. (Fig. 6)





The tow boat will now pick up the lead Flying Scot's tow line and start off slowly. (PULL UP YOUR CENTER BOARD). Once all the slack is out of the lines and the boats are away from the dock the speed will be increased and the tow will proceed to the course.

Drop off procedure: (1) The tow boat will come into the wind and slow to an idle (at a speed enough to keep the boats in a line). Scots will then drop off one at a time starting with the last boat in the tow. Sails may be raised prior to dropping off (skipper's option).





ANOTHER MILESTONE!

In July of 1957 the first fiberglass Flying Scot was launched into Lake Erie. What an event! What a satisfaction to her designer after a full year spent in designing the boat, constructing the wooden prototype, the moulds and then the boat itself.

In July of 1959 the launching of the 100th Flying Scot gave us the great satisfaction of knowing that she had made the grade and was growing to be a national class - which some day might even reach No. 1000! The thousandth Flying Scot came along in July of 1966, nine busy years from the completion of the first. This was the boat the Class raffled off, raising the sum of \$5,300 for the benefit of the United States International Sailing Association whose function is to help our sailing teams to participate in Olympic and other international events. Fred Crapo, (No. 617) who won the raffle, graciously redonated the boat to the USISA which then sold her, making their total receipts some \$7,500. The FSSA can well be proud of this contribution to sailing! No other class has done anything like this.

Now, only five years later, we are about to build the 2,000th Flying Scot; and the FSSA, with over 2,000 boats and 90 fleets, can well be proud of having become one of the major national classes. (And who is to be the proud owner of No. 2000? None other than our esteemed President, Bearns Smith, who leads us into the third "millenium".)

All of this has not been accomplished without many growing pains, without a great deal of hard work by loyal and dedicated Class officers, many of whom have unselfishly worked far beyond the call of duty. We owe them a greater debt than most of us realize.

What of the future? Despite the frequent controversies over "developing" the Flying Scot's rigging - a healthy manifestation of owner interest, by the way, - we have successfully maintained our unique one-design character and, if success can speak for itself, surely are on the right track. Always keep in mind the fact that while as an individual you might wish to make some little changes to suit *your* convenience, *you* bought your Scot because she is as she *is*, one-design. How many of you would be reading this issue of *Scots N' Water* if the Scot had been permitted to develop into a typical present-day racing machine replete with a myriad of go-fasts?

It is my perennial hope that you, the "silent majority" who favor one-design, who agree with my opposition to the recurring proposals to open up our specifications to permit "development" - and I know you agree with me because you tell me you do - will back up your opinion with letters to the Editor instead of leaving it to me, alone, to do. Remember that we run the risk of losing by default to the small but vocal minority, and so it is up to you to make your sentiments known.

PERPETUAL TROPHIES

We still are lacking in one department, that of perpetual trophies for our major competitions such as the North Americans and the District Championships. For the North Americans alone we need fifteen or more, in addition to the Championship Trophy, to cover all of the races of the Championship and Challenger series. Haven't we some generous donors in the Class?

I am happy to report that we have an excellent start, with promises of six trophies to date, offered for the following events: 2nd Place in the North American Championship from Boston Yacht Sail Co.; 3rd Place in the N.A. Championship from George Foster (No. 437) from our London, Ontario Fleet; Paul Schreck has offered a trophy; 1st Place in the 4th Race, Championship Div, from Ratsey & Lapthorn; 1st Place in the 5th Race, Championship Div. from Schaefer Marine; and the Detroit Yacht Club is offering a trophy for the best-sailed club-owned Flying Scot. I am sure I can speak for the Class in saying that we are most appreciative of these offers. This is an excellent start; and I feel sure that there are other individuals, clubs, fleets and companies willing to help the FSSA to give our important races the dignity they deserve. There still is time to have a trophy prepared for presentation at our "2,000th" in Detroit this August. If you have ideas or suggestions, write to me or to President Bearns Smith.




