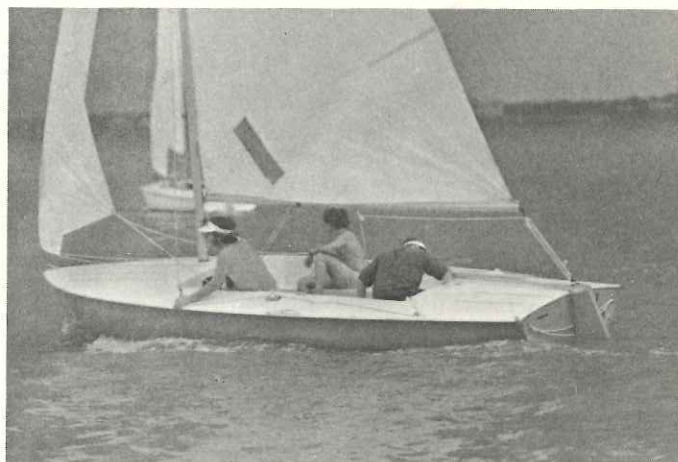

Paul Schreck Regains NAC Championship

The 1972 North American Championship is now history and at the Paul Schreck home in Lillian, Alabama there are a number of new trophies. You might say that Paul made a haul. He won not only the Gordon K. Douglass Trophy but the Schaeffer Marine Trophy (1st place in the Championship Division 5th race), the Fred Crapo Trophy (1st place in Second Division, 1st race), the Paul Schreck Trophy (most 1st places), and 3 first place trophies. Paul lead the way for the Scotters from the Gulf District. Dwight LeBlanc, Jr. from the Southern Yacht Club, New Orleans, La. secured a firm second place with his consistent good sailing. Frank Kleinschrodt III of Mobile, Alabama (and Auburn University) tied with Alfred Schurr of Pensacola, Florida for 3rd but following the horse racing principles, held on to that slot. Alfred is a sailmaker and partner with Paul Schreck. Robert Stine also of Pensacola, Florida moved into second place on the last race to take over 5th place and move John Cameron of Houston to sixth place. Bill Drumm with Tom Spillman as crew, both from Dallas, Texas, took top honors in the Challenger Division, followed in 2nd place by John Oerting of Pensacola, Florida, and John Bartell of Dallas, Texas in 3rd.

Thirty-eight Scots participated in the five race series, sailed in winds ranging from near drifting conditons to rain squalls with 25 knot winds. The sailors with the capability of handling this wide variety, faired the better. Only two capsizes occurred and those were in the last race. The boys from Pensacola and the Gulf District dominated this event. Examination of the race results will bare this out. The fact that Buddy Pollak, the Gulf District Governor served on the Committee Boat with R. K. (Jeff) Jefferies had nothing to do with their success unless it was his cheering them on at every occasion. A detailed account of the series will be published in the next Scots 'n Water.

Annual Meeting Approves Specifications

The new specifications proposed by Fleet 87 and published in the July issue of Scots 'n Water were approved by the membership at the Annual Meeting held in Houston, Texas on August 22. Parts SII - 5 dealing with the centerboard trunk and S IV - 1d dealing with club owned boats were not voted on. Except for these omissions the specifications were approved.

Forty fleets representing 515 active members were represented by proxies.

The treasurer's report indicated cash income of \$20,703 for the nine months ending July 31 which is \$2,100 in excess of expenses. As of July 31 the association had cash on hand of \$10,801.

The charters of Fleet 28 of Sheepshead Bay, New York and Fleet 55 of Wichita, Kansas were revoked.

Bill Burden Wins Prairie District Championship

The Prairie District Flying Scot Championship Regatta was held on Lake Fort Gibson, July 15 and 16, 1972. Twelve boats from four states competed in the five race series. Competition was keen and in several of the races only 100 yards separated the first four boats. The winner was Bill Burden of Joplin, Mo. John Rutledge, Oklahoma City was second and R. E. Morrison of Oklahoma City was third.

At the annual business meeting, Bill Burden was elected District Governor. Wayne Chenevert, Oklahoma City, was named alternate.

Rich Wins Greater New York Championship

District Governor, Bob Rich, Rockville Centre, New York won the Greater New York Championship, sailed out of the Hempstead Bay Sailing Club on June 16, 17, and 18. At the starting line were 26 boats representing 11 fleets from Maryland, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, New York and Connecticut.

The first race was a triangular course with winds a steady 10 mph. The windward end of the line was favored and Bob Rich hit the line at the favored end at the gun and led all the way around the course. Dave Griffin and Ralph Manee fought it out for second and third place respectively. Griffin and Mannee were neck and neck throughout most of the race with Griffin having the leeward position. At times it seemed as if Mannee had passed Griffin but Griffin was not to be denied as he kept the most of his boat out ahead.

In the second race, conditions were similar to the first with Dave Griffin of Riverside Yacht Club in the lead. Jeff Shipman with his father and brother as crew came in a close second, and Bob Rich trailed in third place.

In the third race, the winds shifted to the East resulting in a very long beat in a triangular course. The leeward end of the line was favored and John Aras was in a perfect position at the gun, followed closely by Ralph Mannee. Bob Rich was over early and had to return to the starting line. While everyone crossed the line on a starboard tack, Bob crossed the second time on port and after sailing out into the bay for about ¼ mi., and tacking to starboard, he was in third position. Aras and Mannee fought it out all the way to the finish with both of them just a few feet apart. The final leg was a close reach with Aras getting the gun, Mannee second and Bob Rich third.

In the fourth race, the fleet was scattered in the first leg as the wind lightened and became variable. Dave Herrick rounded the windward mark first, followed by Rich 100 yards behind. Spinnakers were raised and as the fleet headed toward the leeward mark, the wind slowly picked up. The fleet slowly bunched up at the leeward mark and Dave Herrick was unable to hold his lead. Jack Orr with a light crew pulled into the lead followed by Bob Rich second and Sis Rice third. These positions held until the finish.

The fifth race found the weather uncooperative with a strong easterly wind tempered by a constant heavy downpour. The leeward end of the line was favored. Dave Griffin and Bob Rich were neck and neck all the way to the first mark. Rich tacked to starboard at the mark and eeked out a small lead as he rounded it. From the first mark on the first two boats were never separated by more than 10 feet. Spinnakers were raised at the earliest opportunity and held right to the pin. At one point Griffin almost got the inside position at the leeward mark but at the last moment Rich broke the overlap and stayed clear ahead within two lengths of the mark. At the finish it was Rich and Griffin with their spinnakers raised flat out on a reaching plane. Jeff Shipman came up from the middle of the pack for an amazing third.

The final standings showed Rich with a consistent placing in first place, Jeff Shipman second with a 5, 2, 4, 7, 3, and Dave Griffin third with 2, 1, 10, 10, 2.

DiMaio, Blonski, Meno, Ohio District Champs

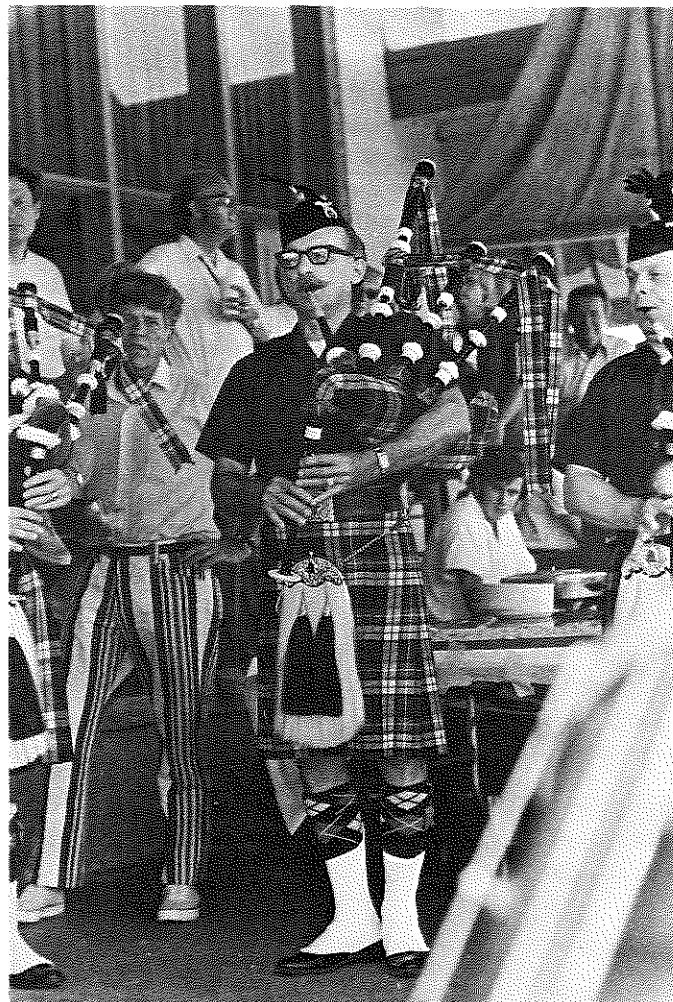

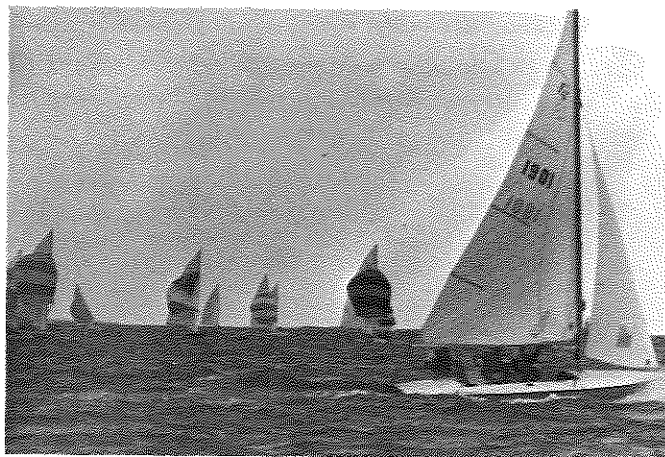

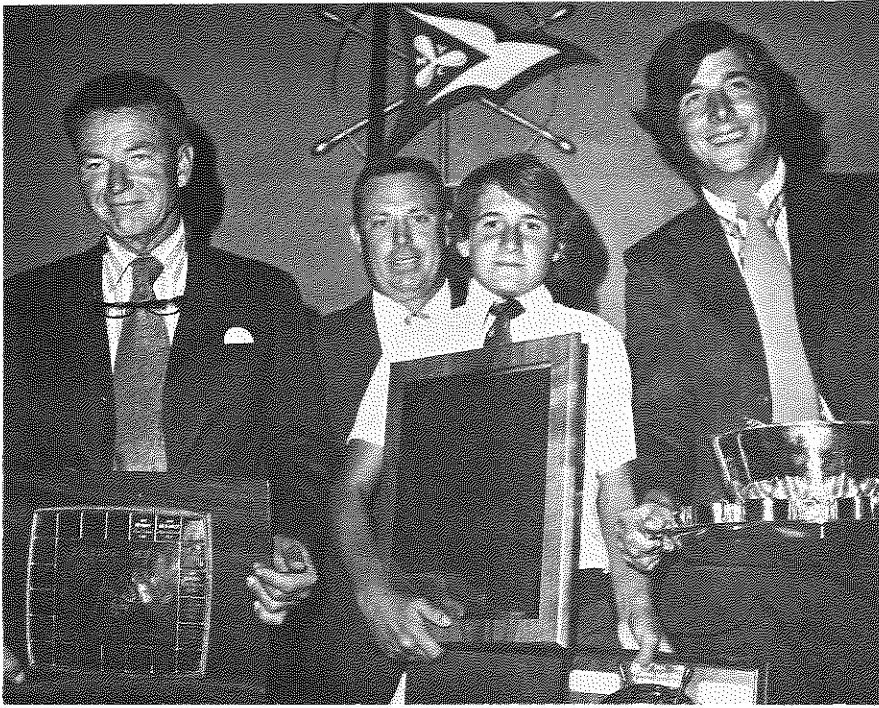

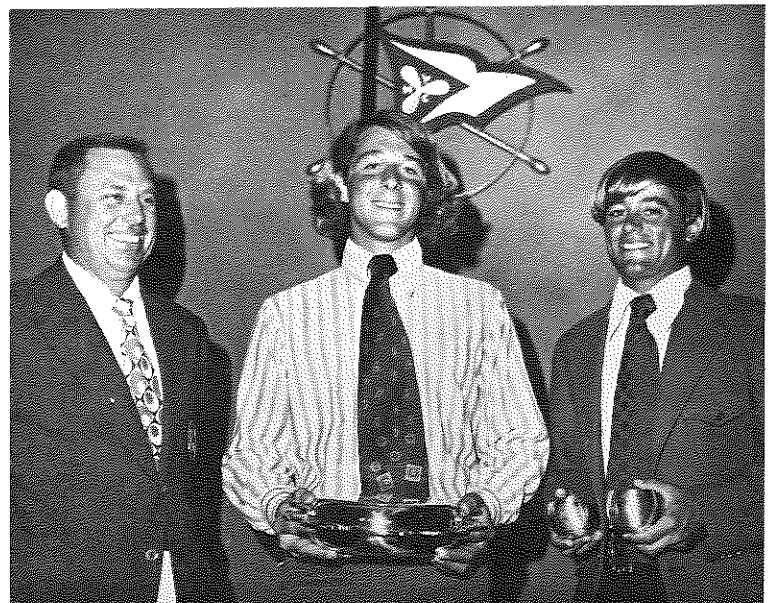

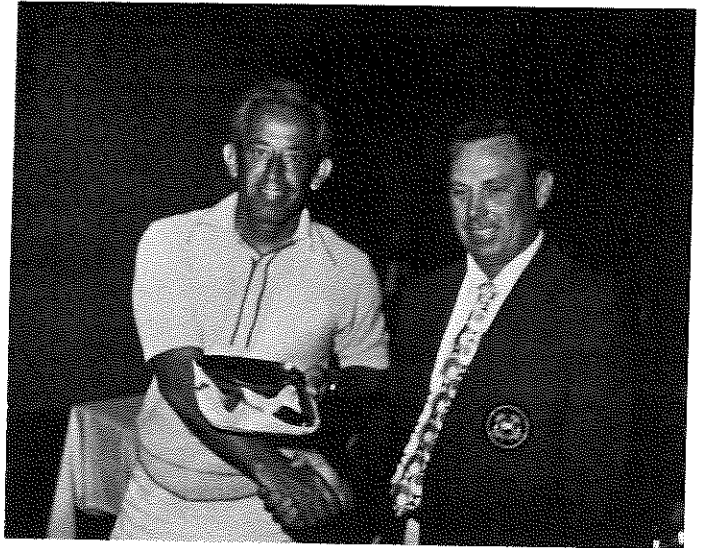

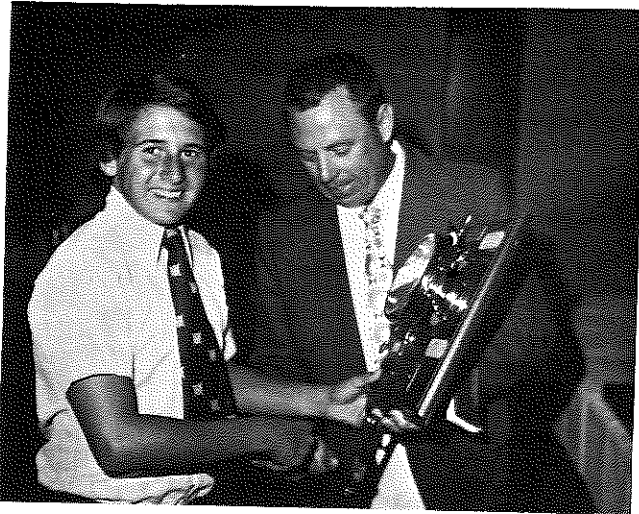

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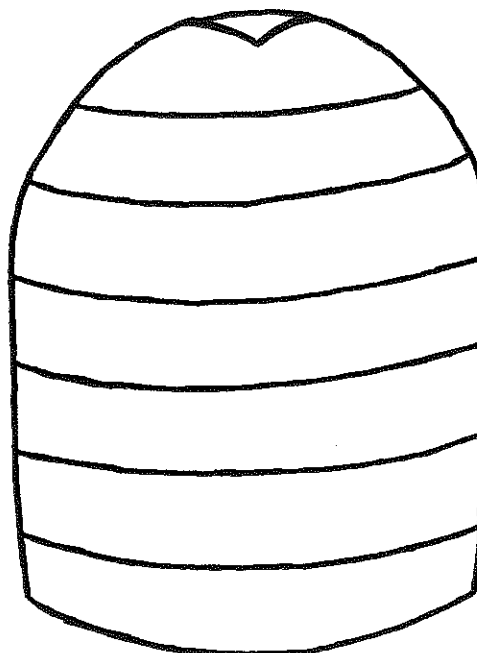
