#### IT'S DOUGLASS FOR THE 6TH TIME AT MONTREAL

The ninth annual Flying Scot Championship, called "The North American Championships" for the first time, saw "Sandy" Douglass of Oakland, Md. aboard "Flying Scot" win decisively in the regatta held on Lake St. Louis off Pointe Claire Yacht Club near Montreal, Aug. 24-26. With his wife Mary and Eric Ammann as crew, Sandy beat Ralph Manee of Toms River, J.J., who was second on "Harmanee", by 24-3/4 points in the 5 race series all sailed in light airs. 60 boats from 24 fleets in 16 states plus Quebec participated. Kent Foster of Cincinnati sailed "Sonic Boom" to a third while Jim Smith of Detroit was fourth.

Most contestants arrived between Sunday and Tuesday and were greeted to gorgeous cool weather and brisk winds when they tried the lake. However, by the time the Championship began Thursday morning, the breezes had departed not to return again. Indeed, the frustrating conditions started the evening before when a tune-up race was abandoned after  $2\frac{1}{2}$  legs of a triangular course and most boats had to be towed home in the dark. Your new President, Fred Weintz of Riverside, Conn., was leading this affair when it was abandoned. He must have "shot his bolt" because he never was a factor in the Championships.

Anyway, the first race on Thursday morning saw E.N.E. winds 4-6 MPH. Sandy obtained a safe leeward position on the fleet at the start and won the Division I race easily over 1960 Class President, Jack Beierwaltes of Winnetka, Ill. They were followed by Foster and Jack Howlett of the host Montreal fleet. Bob Sullivan of Evanston, Ill., won in the other Division with Fred Tears of Dallas second, Ned Parke of Nyack, N.Y., third, and Manee fourth. Incidentally, Sullivan said it was his first victory of the sea-son. The course was a modified "Gold Cup" - triangle plus windward - leeward.

By the time the afternoon race was started, the winds had diminished somewhat. As velocity overall was only 1-4 MPH N.N.E., the course was shortened by one leg. Bill Wickes of Toledo, last year's champion, won in Division I in a close finish over Ernie Godshalk of Wilmette, Ill., this year's Midwest District champ, followed by Bob Cowles of Detroit, Vince DiMaio, the Toledo Scot builder, and Fred Weintz in that order. In Division II, after what Jack Cameron, Race Committee Chairman, described as e finest start he'd ever seen with 25 boats at the line at the gun, Bruce Shannon of Cincinnati was the

ctor followed by Foster, Beierwaltes, Smith, Manee and Douglass.

Scores posted at the annual meeting at Pointe Claire Y.C. that night showed Foster and Beierwaltes tied for first with 5 pts. each followed by Wickes with 5-3/4 and Douglass with 6-3/4.

On Friday, the lake was as flat as glass almost all day, so the morning race was postponed. A faint zephyr showed up in the afternoon, so the third race was started but turned out to be a miserable drifter in variable 0-2 MPH breezes. Only a triangle was sailed. The best "ghosters" were Don Hott of Keyser, W. Va., in Division I who seemed to be sailing in his own private breeze, and Sandy in Division II. He Passed several Div. I boats who watched bug eyed as he nonchalantly glided by standing up most of the

time and walking about to check sails, inspect for sea grass around the rudder and seek out wind patches. In Div. I, George Little of Williston, Vt., was 2nd and Tim Stearn of Sturgeon Bay, Wisc., 3rd. In Div. II, Dick Elam of Austin, Tex. finished 2nd and Dr. Charles Williams of Bethesda, Md. 3rd. As Foster finished 13th and Beierwaltes 17th (in Division II), they lost their overall lead to Sandy who now had  $7\frac{1}{2}$  pts. followed by Wickes with 12-3/4, and then 5 boats with from 16-18 pts. - Tears, Sullivan, Harris Garrett, 1963 lady champ from Dallas, Godshalk, and Foster.

At this point, the fleet was separated into the Championship and Challengers Cup groups while everyone ate, drank, rested, and watched the local junior sailors practice a capsize drill in the calm waters.

With the early evening came a gentle S. W. breeze, so the 4th race was started and run over a triangle plus windward leg in 3-8 MPH winds. Beierwaltes and Douglass fought it out for the gun and Jack got it which event elevated him back into third place with 22-3/4 pts. Godshalk's third put him second overall with 20, but neither skipper threatened Sandy who'd only accumulated  $9\frac{1}{2}$  pts. Parenthetically, Sandy beat Godshalk for second by only six inches by shooting the line at the last instant after both sailed side by side on starboard for the last 100 yards.

In the final race Saturday morning, Sandy luffed near the windward flag end until just before the gun, filled away and captured the start in 6 MPH S. W. winds. After that he narrowly stayed in front until the last leg of the triangle plus windward leeward course when he opened a 1/4 mile margin as his closest pursuers were temporarily stopped when the wind died right at the mark after Sandy had rounded it. Godshalk and Garrett sailed into holes and were 25th and 26th respectively. Elam, Sullivan and Wickes also "tanked" in the fading winds which got down to 2 MPH or less.

It was Ralph Manee, this year's Northeast District Champion with his wife Ethel as crew, who came through in the end. On the final leg made a reach as the wind had veered to the west, he was sailing under spinnaker low of the rhumb line in second place. However, Howlett, Smith, Tears and Foster were to windward and moving faster, also under spinnaker. Just in time, Ralph doused his chute and reached across the course giving up most of his lead over the others in the process. Nevertheless, he managed to stick his stern in front of the parade and from there sailed to a second in the race and second overall. How close it was is illustrated by the fact only 4 points separated 2nd from 6th in the regatta final standings.

Dave Griffin of Riverside, Conn., with his wife Karolyn and 2 kids aboard "Rob Roy", sailed to a 1st and 2nd in the Challengers Cup races and won that Crown followed by W.E. Zimmie of N. Olmsted, Ohio, with Ed Gibbs of Pittsburg third and Paul McRoy of Carbondale, Ill., fourth.

The windup was a marvelous banquet for the adults and rock and roll party for the juniors at the plush modern Royal St. Lawrence Y.C. Saturday evening. In addition to beautiful trophies, the top 3 winners and crew received from E.C. Stevenson, the elder stateman of Montreal sailing, medallions attached to red ribbons similar to those presented at the Pan American Games.

All in all, save for lack of wind, it was a wonderful regatta in the festive atmosphere of Expo '67 and Canada's centennial year. Orville White, who originally conceived the affair and worked so hard to bring it off, his regatta co-chairman Don Brown, Captain of Fleet 36, Jack Cameron of Toronto, Chairman of the Race Committee, Bert Weller, Vice Chairman, Jack Howlett, Arrangements Chairman, and their numerous devoted associates deserve many thanks for a memorable 1967 Championship. We hope we see them all at Riverside in 1968 !



ADDITIONAL MONTREAL NOTES - - - At the FSSA Board of Governors Meeting held at the P.C.Y.C. on August 23rd, the Board authorized, subject to further study and final decision, these increases: -(1) annual active membership dues up to and including \$10.00, (2) builders' boat numbers to \$7.50 and (3) sail labels to \$5.00. Other Board Meeting items included the detailed FSSA Treasurer's Report by Fred Weintz, on a cash basis, showing a Closing Balance on August 18, 1967 of \$2,043.86 which is slightly less than the previous year. After several years of decline, the Association Growth, through the efforts of Tom Meaney and others, now shows an upturn:

th the next FSSA fiscal year, starting November 1, 1967, nine issues of Scots N' Water will be published annually instead of the present twelve, eliminating December, February and October. Classified advertising will also be started with the November 1967 issue, a charge of \$4.00 per ad each issue for advertising the sale of a boat, ad to be approximately 5 square inches in area. The same rate will apply to advertising by suppliers of boat equipment, sails, etc., with an extra charge, at cost, for cuts. A check made out to the Flying Scot Sailing Association should accompany each ad request, to eliminate the necessity of billing. In August 1967, 1150 copies of Scots N' Water were printed, 1070 being mailed by the printer and 80 for other distribution now and later.

The above and other items were covered at the FSSA Annual Meeting held at the P.C Y.C. following supper on August 24th - Slate of officers approved, amendments carried, Ken Parmelee and Fred Weintz presented invitation to hold 1968 F/S North Americans at Riverside, Conn., - accepted with enthusiasm, Jack Cochrane announced that the F/S MidWinter Regatta at Ft. Myers, Fla., will be 2 weeks later in 1968 than in 1967, ----more details about Montreal in next month's Scots N' Water.
