Eagan sweeps NAC

Marc Eagan of New Orleans and Bay Waveland, Miss., won the 1977 North American Flying Scot Championships.

Eagan defeated 84 other entrants, winning all three races in his qualifying series, the first two championship races, and finishing no worse than fifth. In that third race, Eagan performed a 720 on the starting line, and still passed 41 boats to earn his fifth. Eagan finished second in the fourth race.

Highwinds on Lake Charlevoix, Michigan, ended the fifth race.

Eagan was sailing in fifth in the fifth race which was canceled. Had Brad Davis, of Dallas, Texas, finished first and Eagan fifth, Eagan would still have won the regatta. Davis was sailing in second when the committee canceled for winds estimated at 50 miles-per-hour.

Davis was awarded the Fleet 7 trophy for the discontinued fifth race. He finished second in the North Americans.

The left side of the course was favored most of the series, except when winds lightened. Davis proved he could come off of either side because of his speed in the puffs, enhanced by a 540 pound crew. Eagan's crew of three weighed 430, while third place crew on my boat totaled 400 pounds. No two-man boats were in the top ten finishers.

The United States Yacht Racing Union committee did an excellent job of both running the races and rescuing boats. Local rescue boats were not provided, but were needed. The USYRU committee constantly moved the starting line to insure a square line. A skipper could start according to which side of the course the skipper wanted.

The race committee, on the recommendation of the Board of Governors, proposed to eliminate slump hiking as a race instruction. But the proposal was not adopted for the regatta, failing partially for a lack of definition.

The high score trophy—the Paul Schreck trophy for skipper with most first places in the regatta-belonged to Marc Eagan before the regatta ended. Eagan also won the Gordon Douglass first place trophy.

Brad Davis was within 200 yards of the finish of the second race when the committee canceled because winds had risen to an estimated 45-55 miles-per-hour. The cancellation helped Elam—who had broken a main halyard 30 seconds after the start—and others who turned over or fell behind in the gale.

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'Hard Work' wins for Eagan on 3rd try

Marc Eagan

Champion Marc Eagan spent the week before the North American championships ashore, rigging.

"We wanted to make sure nothing broke. We didn't even put the boat in the water to practice," Eagan explained.

As our Scots 'n Water correspondent explains elsewhere, Eagan played the left side of the championship course to advantage.

"I went left because there was a big lift on the left shore...the starting lines were set true to the wind, but the windward mark favored the left side, where there was a constant lift," Eagan explained.

Eagan will spend the next eight months in New York City where he will be attending the College of Insurance.

Champion Eagan, 22, graduated from Loyola University in New Orleans this summer.

For the fourth year, he and crew Ed Turnipseed, also a Scot skipper, teamed. This year they took along John Levy, 13.

Marc was sailing in his third North American Championships. The first year in New Orleans, he finished second. Last year in North Carolina, Marc finished third.

In 1975 Eagan won the 1975 Mid-Winter championships. His brother, Buddy, finished second for a family sweep.

Sailing began for Marc when he was 8 years old, a junior sailor at the Bay Waveland, Miss., Yacht Club.

The boat he sailed to the North American championship was aptly named "Hard Work".

again played the left side of the course, led at the windward mark and never relinquished. Elam, who crossed Eagan on the first leg, sailed the right side of the course, dropping back to eighth, and a third place tie with Schreck. Mockeridge, with a fourth and a second for six points, moved into second place in the regatta, 4½ points behind Eagan who had sailed five races, including qualifying, with five first places.

THIRD RACE (John C. Jones, III trophy)

FINISHES: 1. Elam, 2. Davis, 3. Tom Fhman

Winds: West 12-18

Eagan, involved in a foul at the starting line, performed a 720 at the start, and headed for the left side of the course to try and catch up.

Brad Davis rounded the windward mark first, and held his lead until the fifth, downwind leg. In a battle of Texans, Elam caught Davis on the downwind spinnaker set, and then covered on the last leg home. Ehman, who had finished 13th and 12th the first two races, finished third.

But the regatta was being won by

Eagan who worked back through the fleet, playing the left side of the course on weather legs, to finish fifth. Larry Taggart finished fourth.

At the end of three races, Eagan had 6½ points, Elam, 10¾, Davis 13, Taggart 17, Mockeridge, 17, Paul Blonski, 19, and Schreck, 20. In a regatta where low score would win, Eagan was still in command.

FOURTH RACE (Louis B. Pollack trophy)

FINISHES: 1. Davis, 2. Eagan, 3. Schreck.

Winds: West 16-22

In a race where the top five finished close to each other, Davis, Schreck, and Eagan battled for the lead. Elam rounded the weather mark with Eagan, but hit another Texan, Richard Wade, during the rounding. Elam did a 720, and finished fourth. Ehman finished fifth.

Eagan opened his lead on Elam by 61/4 points, while Davis closed the gap between him and Eagan to 51/4 points. Going into the last race, Eagan had to stay close to the Texans to win.

FIFTH RACE (Fleet No. 7 trophy)
Winds: estimated 50

Canceled with only seven boats still racing. When the race committee boat chased down the remaining competitors, Ehman was leading with Davis second, Taggart was third, and Elam was ahead of Eagan in fifth. Had the yachts finished in that position, Eagan would still have won.

Qualification Series

The first race of the qualification series was sailed in light winds out of the east.

Hal Walker got the start in the first division, and led most of the race. He was passed when the winds went dead and clocked 180 degrees. Tom Ehman won the race in 2 hours, 45 minutes, which took almost the entire time limit.

Marc Eagan won the second division.

The second qualifying race was cancelled before any boats reached the weather mark.

Winds rose for the last two qualifying races to steady 15-20 out of the east. The leaders looked like a repeat from last year's North American Championship—the three young E's. Eagan won two to give him a clean sweep in the qualifying races. Ehman and Kelson Elam won the other firsts.



The last race had to be cancelled after three-and-a-half legs because of high winds.

The USYRU Mobile Race Management Team managed the races well with perfect courses. They fired one or two guns off time a bit, but had the flags right on the button.



We were thrilled to go to West Hampton for the USYRU Area B Championship. Imagine our delight when we won there, and thus advanced to Little Egg Harbor, N.J. to compete in the finals.

Eric Ammann, through the Gordon Douglass Boat Company, Inc., provided nine brand new Scots, and Paul Schreck provided nine sets of new sails. As there were eight area champions in the finals, the ninth boat was back-up in case of break-downs. Naturally, there were none, and the ninth boat was never in the water.

round-robin—all crews using all boats—if the boats are not equal. For example, if the best crew draws the "dog" boat in the same race that a weak crew sails the best boat, that best crew may lose several places purely due to boat differences.

My team felt that not only were the boats (personally rigged by Sandy Douglass) fair to all competitors, but also that the Flying Scot itself is fair.

There was a good deal of wind and chop on the first of the three days of races. I can't say exactly how much wind because at that night's dinner party (the Little Egg Harbor Yacht Club did everything beautifully) I kept saying, "Wow, it blew a gale", and the local people replied, "We call that 'light to moderate." The point I want to make is that I don't know of any other boat in which youth and strength are not decisive.

Naturally, youth and strength are nice—even if one only wants to take a walk—but our third place in no way depended on youth and strength. First and second places were won by better sailors. We were better than fourth through eighth teams.






