have always loved this saying. This was the winning design on Ephraim Yacht Club's (EYC) 2000 Ephraim Regatta shirt. Guess who designed it? EYC Junior J.P. Pillat. He was the winner of a contest for Juniors to design the regatta shirt that year, and he captured life very well for Juniors who like to sail (see photo). We, at FSSA, are committed to getting more Juniors involved in Flying Scot sailing and racing and would love to get your input.

Just as with adults, there are kids who may have started out in an Opti, a Sunfish, a 420, FJ — or even a Scot — and got the "bug" to race. There are others who have no interest in racing, but like sailing. Sailing is FUN. Like most sports, if you take kids out in ideal conditions, they might really like sailing.

Please make a point to get kids out on Scots, whether or not you have a junior program. There is nothing more fun than having an adult take out a Scot with at least six kids on it who are sitting on the seats, sitting on the deck, or straddling the forestay with their feet hanging in the water, having a great time and not worrying about the heel of the boat or falling overboard.

A way to entice kids to come out with their peers and just have fun can be called "Adventure Sailing". What kid doesn't like

the idea of going on an adventure, especially using a sailboat? You could sail to a certain point on a lake, go find the donuts or watermelon that were left there for you to find, eat all you want and sail home. What about everyone capsizing a Scot with their swimsuits and life jackets on and then getting the boat back up, bailing it out, and sailing home? What about tying a line to the stern rings so that kids can surf behind the boat lying on a flotation board and holding onto a line while adults are sailing the boat fast enough to make it fun? Many of you have certain coves, secret

forests, and other destinations with neat rocks or beaches where you can take kids adventure sailing and swimming. What about learning about the points of sailing and maneuvering the Scot to get into a surprise attack position for a water gun fight?


And then there are the kids who want to race. Get them out on a Scot. What better boat to use to learn about a spinnaker and get spinnaker practice? Partner up with some juniors and, depending on their experience, let them drive your boat. When they can drive

a car, encourage them to help trail a boat to a regatta. By the way, I consider it a life skill to learn how to hook up, drive, and back up a boat (any kind of boat) properly. I know that my sailing made a marked improvement when my parents told me that I could skipper the Flying Scot, and they would crew for me. This was a big difference from the smaller two-man boats we had in sailing lessons.

Besides getting kids involved in local and regional regattas, FSSA would like to follow the model we have successfully used for the Women's North American Championship -- make the Junior North American Championship a stand-alone weekend event. We have discussed this at recent Town Hall meetings. Like our other national events, we will be looking for a host club. Kids and their parents/crew can bring

a boat or the host club could offer boats for charter. This event would be designed for kids to hang out with their fellow sailors.

Please contact me if: 1) you have suggestions for adventure sailing for kids in Flying Scots that we can share with others, and 2) if you'd like to participate on a committee to help get a new FSSA Junior Championship started! While there are those of us who might like to have the option to just eat, sleep and sail, let's promote this concept in making sailing and racing Scots attractive to our Juniors!

And Eileen Hoffman did a super job promoting the event while keeping us up to date with awesome photos taken by several photographers. And I was able to snag a SCYC burgee for my collection, swapping for a Massapoag Yacht Club burgee.



We left our home in MA on Thursday 7/7 at 11AM and got to Ashtabula, OH, in the evening, and settled in at the local Walmart. This is such a good deal for RV travelers and trailer trucks to be able to park overnight for free. Of course, we usually plan to spend some money on food or something at Walmart, so it works well for both parties. We headed for the club on Friday, hoping to get there a little early to help with measurement. The FSSA Measurer Roger Sharp and his wife Kate were unable to make the trip due to a recent hit-and-run car accident that left them without a car and boat (both Roger and Kate are well). Mark Riefenhauser was there to help and the team at North Cape led by Brian Turner did a great job on measurement. There were 48 teams from several states and the competition was going to be fierce and fun. Each team came in wondering -

Who makes Championship? Challenger? Where would you rather be? Will the boat and sails measure in? Well, after two days of measuring, and a few adjustments, all boats were ready to race! Check-in was easy thanks to Natalie Hill, and each of us was given a tag with a number corresponding to our assigned parking space, courtesy of North Sails. The tag was put on our trailer to help the volunteers park and retrieve our trailers when launching or coming in. Parking spots were assigned based on order of registration so early registrants got spaces closest to the launches. Ours was about 150' from the launch so it was nifty for us!

While measurement and check-in continued on Sunday, there was a practice race, and we went out to sail but did not participate in the practice. It was a beautiful sunny day with ENE winds, 10-12 MPH, and 2-3 foot waves. We came back in for the skippers meeting and welcome party. Eric thanked all the participants

and volunteers, of which there were over 100 people helping over the 6 days of the event. Yes, I said over 100 volunteers — what a club!

On Monday, we had the qualifiers and tried to get 3 races in. The winds were 18-19 MPH with some higher gusts and the wind kept on building. Race 1 was tough and race 2 was even tougher! PRO Matt Bounds called it a day after 2 races, erring on the side of safety and working to stay within our class rules as well as using common sense. The results of this day gave us the Championship and Challenger Division splits for the rest of the week. Greg and I made the Championship Division for the first time in years, so we were pleased with having stayed out there and toughed out the conditions. Meanwhile, Dory, our four legged fair weather crew, was back in the Roadtrek, happy as can be, not knowing how hard we were working out there!








## My Vintage Flying Scot, Peg

saw my first Flying Scot in 1979 lying on its side in the back of a boat yard in St. Thomas in the US Virgin Islands, and I bought it immediately. ■It's not that I was impressed with the boat, but rather it was the longest hull that appeared would float that the limited funds someone just out of graduate school could afford. Over four decades later, I have never once regretted buying Flying Scot Hull #510.

Now named Peg, Hull #510 I deter-

mined, was built in 1963 by Loftland Boat Company in Wichita, Kansas. How she got to be where I met her, I do not know and most likely will never know. She came to me with much worn sails, mast, boom, rudder, tiller, centerboard, manufacturer's tag on her transom, hull number on her wooden centerboard cap and little else. In those pre-internet days, it took me quite a while to work out how to properly rig and outfit her to original specifications, but she came along quite nicely as I settled

in to building a family and a profession. Fortunately, Loftland very early on guided me to the Gordon Douglas Boat Company, and from them I obtained a parts list and diagrams as well as advice and invaluable encouragement. I joined the Flying Scot Sailing Association, and I have benefited from that membership ever since.

My intent in getting Peg was to improve sailing skills, so that I might eventually move up to owning a bigger sailboat. While I became a better sailor, I quickly came to









appreciate and value the benefits of owning a small well-built affordable boat that I could maintain and sail myself.

I lived in Xenia, Ohio for six years beginning in 1987 and left Peg for the second time in care of my brother in the British Virgin Islands. While in Ohio, I saw another Flying Scot for the very first time. This occurred at the observance of the thirtieth anniversary of the Flying Scot at Cowan Lake. Equally thrilling for me that day though was to meet and chat with the class' designer, Sandy Douglas.

Peg has been kept as original as I met her. The cap on her centerboard, the

bases for her original snubbing winches and her cleats are all varnished teak. As if in return, Peg continues to provide me with immense joy and memories. I have had the opportunity to introduce many people to sailing because of her. She remained nameless after being acquired until I married my wife Peggy in 1983. My daughter, Crew, bears her name from having been part of countless pre-birth afternoon sails on Peg even one just two weeks before she was delivered into this world. Peg has always been kept in the water. She was holed in Hurricane Marilyn in 1993 and though having been turtled, she came through Hurricanes Irma and Maria in September 2017 quite well.

I have done much sailing over the years, including many major regattas, yacht deliveries around the Caribbean, and even an Atlantic crossing. Currently I teach sailing to young people using what I believe to be the second Flying Scot (Hull #2573) that has been to U. S. Virgin Islands' shores. The newer boat is great, however and without a doubt, vintage Peg (Flying Scot Hull #510) continues to be my pick as number one of all the boats I have ever sailed.

## **Ode to Flying Scot FS#70**



lying Scot #70 was built by the Gordon Douglas Boat Company sometime toward the end of 1958 to early 1959. The original owner was Creston "Creck" Stewart, who was a very early member of the Flying Scot Sailing Association. Creck sailed #70 at Leatherlips Yacht Club in Columbus for many years then moved to Hoover Sailing Club in the late 1960's. He was an active club racer into his early 70's, and I had the pleasure of crewing for Creck when I was in high school. Previously, I was the third in my parent's Scot #490. I learned quite a bit from Creck, including how to properly fly a spinnaker.

All of the control lines for the spinnaker on #70 were at that time forward in the cockpit, so the crew raised and flew the chute. On a downwind leg Creck would cross one leg over the other, he lit a cigarette, and calmly gave me instruction on how to trim the sail.

I left for college in 1972, and Creck eventually retired from sailing and sold the boat to another HSC member, Matt Webber. In November 1985, after I was working full time, I bought the boat and have kept it since then at Hoover Sailing Club. For many years I raced the boat in club races and in various Flying Scot regattas. Our Scot fleet no longer races much, so mostly I race an MC Scow and use #70 in our annual Buckeye Regatta and for pleasure sailing.

Keeping a boat competitive and sea worthy for so many years requires significant work from time to time, along with occasional upgrades. Over the years #70 has had a new mast, a couple of booms, some re-coring with balsa, a new trailer, a new rudder head, and of course the phenolic fittings were replaced long ago. Most importantly the boat was stored correctly during the winter. Very few things age a boat more than an Ohio winter with a poor cover. What has not been replaced is the beautiful mahogany centerboard cap, the centerboard and the tiller. I'm now 68, I'm planning to keep the boat till my last day of sailing, when I hope to find someone who will be its next caretaker. 📤







# The Dauntless Badger from Wisconsin

have spent most of my life on the water including swimming competitively for the local YMCA for 12 years. My parents took my siblings and me to the Y to learn to swim because we spend our summers on the waters of Green Bay near Dyckesville, WI. A rite of passage that accompanied the ability to use our boats was to swim a quarter of a mile from one pier on the beach to ours without stopping.

Over the years, I sailed on many different boats including a Sunfish, Snipe, Rebel, Dolphin, and Hobie Cats. When I lived in Houston, I crewed on a Soling running the foredeck, and I learned the meaning of DFL through no fault of the boat or the captain. After my career brought me back to Green Bay and I purchased my grandparents' cottage, I purchased a Hobie 18 SX. It was a very fast and fun boat to sail, which I kept on our beach. The water levels on the Bay have a long history of rising and falling with recent levels increasing to record highs. I ran out of beach and I had to sell my Hobie. I began to truly miss the magic of sailing.

I purchased a Hobie One from a family down the beach that included a trailer and a hoist. Unfortunately, it was too small for my wife and me to sail comfortably. I decided to donate it to Green Bay Sail and Paddle, a non-profit that teaches children of all ages to sail. I kept the hoist and began my search for another boat. The internet helped me determine that the Flying Scot would meet my needs for a fast, dry and stable boat.

The Flying Scot Sailing Association has a marvelous website, and with a little detective work, I found the names of the Districts and Fleet Commanders. I sent an email to all of the fleets in Wisconsin and the surrounding states. Within a few weeks I received a reply that someone in Michigan wanted to sell their Scot. This past April, I purchased FS 3132 sight unseen, from the owner who had purchased it new from the Customflex factory in 1978. According to the information I was given when I picked up the boat, Tom Ehman, a national champion at the time who later became the President of US Sailing, aided in the setup of FS 3132.

Dauntless, as they named her, spent her life on Gull Lake sailing a family of five and won many championships over the years including the Bob Boudeman Club Championship at the Gull Lake Yacht Club. It was carefully maintained and never spent a night in the water. In fact, the trailer had never been in the water either. The boat was always lifted into the water with a crane and then placed back on the trailer at the end of the day.

I was told the boat had bullet holes in the transom that had never been repaired because they were above the waterline. When I picked up the boat, the owner told me it was their joke, that the rest of the fleet took pot shots at them because they were always ahead!

I have stayed in touch with the previous owner, promising that I would love and care for FS 3132, now renamed Badger, and that she has a good home. I have had questions about the boat and asked her why the centerboard hummed. I was told it was because she was happy. She has a pedigree I will try to live up to, and I am looking forward to sailing with my wife and grandkids.

I have learned two truths over the years living in Wisconsin. First, if you do not like snow, buy a snowmobile. It won't snow enough for years. Second, if you want no wind or too much wind, buy a sailboat. Here it is mid-July, and my wife and I have only been out three times. Let's hope for better winds for the last half of our all tooshort Wisconsin summer. Maybe today... 📤





# A Near Perfect New England Day at the 2022 District Championship on Cape Cod

It must have got away from them since they were over early in two of the five races.

PRO John King and the Race Committee ran 5 races, 4 Windward-Leeward courses of various lengths and one modified Olympic course. With winds blowing 15-18 MPH from the north for the first 2 races, the teams toiled a bit, and luckily the wind was steady. The first race was about an hour long, so the race committee made the next one a little shorter, about 45 minutes. There was traffic at the gates, so figuring out which way to go was a challenge. We chose wisely one time and not so wisely the other time.

The wind laid down a bit for the 3rd through 5th races - it was 10-12 MPH, still from the north. Race 3 was
