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President's Letter #7: Have There Been That Many Already?!

Throughout the country, folks are going to last regattas of the season and packing up their Scot for the long winter. Those who live in Florida are doing the opposite and the start of sailing season is broken up by hurricane preparation and cleanup. As the seasons turn, hope springs eternal for your favorite football team. For those of us who are Tarheel born that means basketball will soon be upon us too.

As we wind up the year, it is worth reflecting on accomplishments and what is still on our plates. We have had very successful national regattas ranging from the Midwinters, the North Americans, Women's Championship and the recently completed Wife-Husband Championship. Thanks to First Vice President Nina Cummings for working with our hosts to make these events memorable. Our 2025 National events schedule has come together and promises to build on the success. Membership is the strongest it has been in several years. Thanks go to Second Vice President Bruce Kitchen for leading that charge. While we did not get to a thou we sure scared it to death. I will confess we got closer than I thought we could. FSSA finances are strong thanks in part to the vibrant membership.

In addition to looking backwards at our collective successes, it is important to start planning for 2025. One, continuing to grow membership will remain an area of focus. Part of this is communicating the value of membership and particularly at the fleet level asking folks to join. Two, securing venues for 2026 and beyond remains a challenge. Some of this is due to the long lead times and getting clubs to commit to having 100 plus Scot sailors spend four or five days at your club. This in turn requires significant commitment of people and resources from the host to make this happen. That being said, be sure to thank your regatta hosts early and often. Three, participation at our events has been strong but it could always be stronger. If you have not been to a national event plan on doing it next year. You will enjoy the sailing, but more importantly you will make many new friends that you will look

forward to seeing at future events. **Four**, we are looking closely at our class rules to insure they are supporting our goals. As the world has evolved over the last sixty plus years some of the rules remain essential yet others have outlived their usefulness. Of course, the challenge is figuring out the difference. **Five**, the website migration will allow all of us to better access online information. Finally, the communications task force has provided us some thoughts on how we can more effectively communicate with our members and other stakeholders.

An important challenge to an organization like ours, which has stood the test of time, is how we adapt to change and yet maintain our traditions. In 1987, the Wife-Husband Championship was founded to foster competition among married couples. Since then, society's definition of marriage evolved so it is not only between a man and woman. Our Bylaws require competitors to be spouses, which means in a legal marriage. As a result, any couple with a legal marriage may compete. However, the event's name does not reflect this and may unintentionally turn people away from participating in one of the class's best events. To that end, 2nd Vice President Bruce Kitchen is leading an effort to determine what our course of action should be. Please contact him, or any of your officers, to share your views. This is a particularly challenging issue to navigate since there are strongly held views. The class leadership is somewhat like the hero from Homer's epic poem, "The Odyssey" where Ulysses has to steer his ship between the twin perils of Scylla (a sea monster) and Charybdis (a whirlpool). He successfully navigated these challenges due to the guidance of Circe. The Executive Committee has been and remains open to discussion of this issue like any other, so we can make the best decision possible for all members. Please contact one of your officers, or you are welcome to attend one of our monthly meetings.

While we are in the off season for most of us, that does not mean it is time to forget about sailing. After winterizing your boat, make a list of what needs to be done and do it. How many of us have

Fresh Scot

e are not quite two decades into the Flying Scot. It's been a speedy eighteen years since my favorite skipper picked that first nice used Flying Scot in 2006. Al Terhune steered us toward Hull #4925, which came complete with trailer, canvas covers, and some sails from New Jersey.

We named it The Mighty Majestic for the way it handled Tampa Bay chop, and the boat carried us to a couple of North American Championships before we horse-traded with Harry Carpenter at Flying Scot Inc. for the nearly-new #5982.


Harry had campaigned the boat, which we dubbed Speckled Butterbean, for a season or so, minus the quirky, Southernvegetable-inspired name.

A few NACs after that, we traded the Bean for another all-white boat, #6133, which Harry delivered to Tampa. We called it The Scuppernong, which is a green American grape native to the Atlantic seaboard that Jeff claims is in fact inedible.

This year, after the NACs in Cedar Point, we made a deal with Tyler Andrews and traded The Scuppernong for a brandnew boat made by the next generation at Flying Scot, Inc.

#6305, The Molly Whomper, hit the water for the first time this weekend in Jacksonville. The name comes from a large green heirloom apple variety and has the official stamp of approval from Bill and Lynne Bruss of Chattanooga.

We did some minimal rigging to this factory-fresh boat: Jeff installed EVA Continued On Next Page



closed-cell cushioning for grippy footing in the sole of the boat, our own lines, a Masthead Big-Bertha launching bag on the port side, and a Mad Sails launching bag (smaller, and with a nifty clear pocket for the radio) on the starboard side.

My skipper didn't want to go through the usual growing pangs that occur when new standing rigging is installed. Wire cables "weather in," which means the tension and positioning of the mast and shrouds typically require fiddling until they are fully settled.

Mr. Linton, a fan of useful shortcuts, decided to skip that fiddling phase. He figured he'd just slap the new mast and old shrouds into the new boat.

Boats are made, often, with a blend of hand-crafting and manufacturing that risks making one-of-a-kind vessels. For a one-design class, this is dogs-and-catsliving-together-crossing-the-streams-level BAD. Each boat in a class should be as nearly identical as possible with any other class boat.

So what a joy it was when the mast went up, the shrouds went in, and huzzah! everything fit with zero fiddling.


It's a testament to Tyler and all the folks at Flying Scot Inc. that the one-design portion of the class is holding true.

How did the maiden voyage go? We had a wonderful weekend at the Rudder Club of Jacksonville. Jon Hamilton and Donna Mohr are wonderful hosts, and the breeze gods/goddesses smiled on the fleet.

The Rudder Club gave us five races (the district regatta in full) by 4 pm on Saturday. The Molly Whomper had her first victory (and a few celebratory splashes of beer), and we are pleased as punch with the boat and her out-of-thebox performance.

Knock wood we are lucky enough to keep racing and enjoying these cheerful

little boats for (egads!) another eighteen years. Perhaps we'll even have a followup story one day about hull, oh, I don't know — #6724 and #7013? ♣

By the time you read this football will be in full swing and basketball will have started. While these spectator sports are great you can still sail, talk about next year, and finally tackle that project list! \triangle

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
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
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Article of the Year: **Ahoy Spouses!**

hether you are a seasoned Flying Scot sailor or not, if you do not regularly race your lovely craft with your spouse, then this is the year to be brave and take the plunge. In fact, we are taking a bit of a plunge ourselves by hosting a major regatta while we are still arguably wet behind the ears. Our stillnew Fleet 211 berthed at the Atlanta Yacht Club (AYC) on Lake Allatoona, Georgia, is revving up to offer a first-class Flying Scot event in September. We promise a hospitable venue that will be memorable for all spouses. Lest you think we are new at this regatta stuff, we hasten to assure you that it is only our fleet that is young. AYC members have hosted major regattas for its several one-design fleets for over 70 years, and we're pretty darn good at it! Our Scot Fleet is fortunate to have support from the entire club for a successful and fun weekend start to finish.

For anyone who might feel - shall we say, cautious? about racing in a major event with your spouse, consider



that AYC is known for its hospitable, relaxing environment, but at the same time for well-run racing and first-class competition (we're counting on you to provide that part!). Forget about the Atlanta big-city feel and remember that our home is actually adjacent to the not-so-bustling metropolis of Acworth, Georgia. Once you enter our club grounds you will be in another world that is all about fresh air, fun sailing, and good friends. Whether you are a seasoned racing couple or your spouse is waiting to be encouraged, we offer the same, stress-free invitation to those at both ends of the spectrum.

AYC is located about 35 miles northwest of Atlanta, on the south shore of Lake Allatoona, a 75-year-old inland lake formed from river dams built by the Army Corps of Engineers. The Club is home to five other one-design fleets, now six with the addition of the Flying Scots. In addition to the annual regattas that are hosted, we have scheduled Club races on almost all weekends from March to September. We do not have hoists, but there are two double ramps adjacent to our docks, which offer plenty of space to tie up and leave your boat overnight if you wish. Parking is plentiful, and other class boats will be moved to make space for you while our guests. We will have a team of helpers

to assist with launching and haul-out. For guests with campers or RVs, several boat launch vehicles with drivers will be available to get your boat in and out of the water.

As for lodging, there are numerous chain motels hovering around the intersection of I-75 and GA 92, approximately 3.5 miles from the Club. We have arranged for a special price at the Holiday Inn Express and Suites Acworth on the Friday and Saturday of the regatta, which information you will find in the NOR or on the AYC website under "Regattas." The motel is recently renovated, and a very nice breakfast is offered.

For those who camp, we offer plenty of space for tents and small campers on the lawn across from the Clubhouse, where you will have access to restroom facilities both upstairs and down, as well as a spacious shower room on the lower level. We have a designated campground down by the waterfront swimming beach, with more room for campers and tents. There are several 120v outlets, water, and picnic tables. Port-a-potties are nearby, but it is only a short walk to the Clubhouse if you prefer. Finally, we have two parking spots for RVs across from the Clubhouse that offer full hookups. These are available on a first-come, first-served basis. Please be reminded that guests are not permitted



to bring motorcycles, firearms or pets onto Club grounds.

The AYC Clubhouse was recently rebuilt with a full kitchen, spacious indoor dining, and laid-back atmosphere.
