SANDY SAYS -

SOME HELPFUL WRINKLES - - - - AND SIMPLE SOLUTIONS TO KNOTTY PROBLEMS!

Let's start off with taking kinks out of a new line. Twisted lines, such as anchor lines when new, are stiff and kinky. To take out the kinks, stream the line astern while you are sailing, and watch it untwist itself. If you are ashore, stretch it out on the ground, full length. Then, as you draw it toward

you, forming a coil, it will rotate and rid itself of its kinks. Streaming it is better, however.

To keep from losing the end of the main sheet, and to prevent the boom from hitting the shroud on a run, tie a figure eight stopper knot in it where it will hit the fiddle block just before the boom will hit the shroud.

As an aid in trimming the jib, wrap some black tape around the sheet just forward of the lead block when you are closest hauled on a beat. It will make a good reference point to show you just how your crew has trimmed the jib. (More of this later in LIGHT WIND SAIL-ING.)

Before you leave the mooring on a windy day, drop your sheets overboard to wet them. They then will hold better around winches, cleats and hands.

I don't want to seem to keep whipping a dead horse, but the subject of raising the Scot mast keeps coming up; and depending on how it is done, it can be a simple operation or an ordeal approached with trepidation. I find myself more and more impressed and astounded at the ingenuity of many sailors in finding difficult and complicated ways to accomplish simple results. Having just received my copy of the May issue of SCOTS N' WATER with its illustration of Ed Smith's A-frame for raising the mast, I am almost speechless! It makes me think of the story told by my biology professor about experiments in studying the learning habits of a raccoon which was separated from its dinner by a door held by a hook and eye. As the raccoon became hungrier and more desperate, he tried one means after another to open the door. Finally, while standing on his head and pawing at the bottom of the door, his tail happened to hit and lift the hook. Ergo, thereafter when he wanted his dinner, he stood on his head and pawed at the bottom of the door until his tail lifted the hook!

There is no "easy" way to raise a mast 26 feet tall and weighing 40 pounds, but obviously some methods are better than others, some are surer and safer than others. Having over the years seen many variations on the theme, having done it myself a thousand times - and many times all by myself - and by different methods, I have been able to reach certain conclusions.

The two basic methods of raising the Scot mast are those of stepping in into the tabernacle, and footing it at the mast step,

with or without a mast pin. There is no magic to the mast pin, the mast does not go up by itself; and I have steadfastly maintained, on the basis of broad experience, that it makes the job more difficult because of the lack of lateral guidance and because of the increased adverse leverage of the top of the mast. Have I been wrong? Recently we decided to find out by actual measurement of forces.

What was the result? Using the mast pin, when the mast was at its most critical angle, I had to push with a force of 55 pounds. With the mast supported in the tabernacle, at this point the force required was less than 35 pounds. Q. E. D.

BOAT TRAILER LAWS ACCEPTABLE TO ALL STATES, AS AFFECTING A FLYING SCOT IN TRANSIT

Hitches are almost universally required.

No chains are required in Alabama, Arizona, Connecticut, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Louisiana, Maryland, Mississippi, Missouri, Montana, North Carolina, New Mexico, New York, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, West Virginia and Wyoming.

Tail, plate, stop and turn lights are almost universally required. Furthermore, most states require an additional red light on the end of a load extending more than 4-feet beyond the trailer. Use a red flag by day.

Lights may be attached to the boat transom instead of the trailer, except in Arizona, Colorado, Kansas, Massachusetts, Michigan, Nevada, New Hampshire, North Carolina, North Dakota and Virginia.

Illinois Tollway Joker - Vehicles with loads extending more than 4-feet beyond rear of body require a \$10 permit, and may not travel on Saturdays, Sundays or Holidays, nor ever between Sunset and Sunup.


