The Flying Scot North American Championship is a restricted event. The FSSA Governing Board has again suspended the By-Laws dealing with quotas and qualifications and for the 1969 North American Regatta has adopted the rules summarized below. The same 1-for-3 quota will apply to fleets. All boats must be registered and everyone's dues must be paid, both by July 1st at the latest. In addition, FSSA events in which Unattached Members can qualify have been designated, and all skippers of club-owned boats must be "senior-co-owner-type" members of the FSSA.

### ELIGIBILITY - 1969 REGATTA

AUTOMATICALLY QUALIFIED: The 1968 Flying Scot North American Champion Frank Bloomer, FSSA President Fred Weintz, Chief Measurer Chuck Edgar, and the Designer of you-know-what, Gordon K. Douglass.

FSSA-CHARTERED FLEETS: Quota: 1 for 3. One FSSA-member-boat for every three FSSA-member-boats in each fleet. (The more FSSA members you have, the more boats you can send to Mobile Bay.)

CLUB BOATS: Same quota: 1 for 3. Skippers of club-owned boats must be paid-up (\$10) "senior-co-owner-type" members of the FSSA.

UNATTACHED FSSA-MEMBER BOATS (not a member of a chartered fleet): If, prior to August 4th and while a member in good standing of the FSSA, the skipper has sailed in one of the following "designated" events: FSSA National, FSSA North American, FSSA District, FSSA Regional, or FSSA Mid-Winter Championship Regatta. (Any year will do.)

1969 DUES: FSSA dues and fleet dues (if any) must be paid by July 1, 1969. (They're due in January, you know.)

NEW BOATS: The roster of boat owners closes for NAC qualification purposes on July 1st. (Anybody buying a Flying Scot after that time will just have to wait until next year.)

SPECIAL DISPENSATIONS: Those unable to qualify on the above basis -- through no fault of their own -- may petition the FSSA Executive Committee. Their decision will be made in plenty of time for you to pack up and get to Mobile Bay or stay home, as the case may be. (Heaven forbid, but the last "designated" regatta might be blown out after you got there.)

REGISTRATION FORMS: Will be printed in the May issue of SCOTS N' WATER. CHARTERING: Rules for chartering a Flying Scot for the NAC appeared in the March issue. HOUSING: See opposite page this issue. A map of the Fairhope, Alabama, area and additional housing data will be sent out to all registrants.

REMINDER TO FLYING SCOT OWNERS: If your Co-Owner or your (his) husband/wife, son, or daughter expects to skip your boat in the 1969 North American, your own 1969 dues as well as your skipper's dues must be paid by July 1st. Don't forget, if you have a partner who in good faith has a financial interest in your Flying Scot, his name as well as yours must appear on your FSSA recorded Registration Certificate.

This is the first opportunity for our Southern friends to host this regatta. You-all come, hear?

# HOUSING AND ENTERTAINMENT (It's not too early to start planning!)

Flying Scot Fleets 38 and 45 will host the regatta August 4-8 with initial registration and measuring on Sunday, August 3rd. Races will be sailed out of the Fairhope Yacht Club; Mobile Bay being about ten miles wide at this point, with 15-18 knot winds and a two-to-three foot chop usual on summer afternoons. Mean temperature 80°, with the high never over 90°.

Those wishing to combine the Championship with vacation-sightseeing will find no end of local attractions. Fairhope, now 5,000 population, has the distinction of being founded in 1894 as the only single-tax colony in the country. At nearby Spanish Fort one may see the remains of the trenches of the last battle of the Civil War where cannon balls are still being dug up. Across the bay is Mobile, a city of more than 300,000 in its metropolitan area, with history dating back to 1711. Other attractions include historic Forts Morgan and Gaines, famous Bellingrath Gardens and the battleship USS Alabama, aboard which the Flying Scot Annual Meeting is now tentatively scheduled. There is plenty of fishing, swimming, and golf available in the vicinity.

### SIGHTING LAY-LINES ACROSS THE BOW DECK, BEATING IN A STEADY WIND & CURRENT

Vectors on the drawing board can only be of interest to a mathematician. To be used by a skipper they must be out on the deck where they can be seen, or imagined.


Draw a large circle on the bow deck, as sketched below.

Make two marks,  $\underline{R}$  and  $\underline{G}$ , on the circumference on each side of the center-line aft subtending angles of  $5^{\overline{O}}$  from the center  $\underline{O}$  -- approximating the leeway angles.  $\underline{RO}$  and  $\underline{GO}$  represent the boat speed and direction through the water, on respective tacks.

With the Wind relative to water  $\underline{Ww}$  at  $45^{\circ}$  on the Port bow, place a RED mark in the circle in the direction of Current flow and at a radius proportional to its speed. Call this mark  $\underline{R'}$ . Then  $\underline{RR'}$  shows the relative bearing of the Port lay-line.

Place a GREEN mark at the same radius but  $90^{\circ}$  clockwise from R' and call it G'. Then GG' shows the relative bearing of the Starboard lay-line when on starboard tack.

If the vectors OR' and OG' should touch the anchor segments for their respective tacks, no progress can be made.

ADDENDUM: Henry says that when the vectors named touch the anchor segments you should anchor. Really, why not head for the harbor the best way you could get there -- paddle, motor, or friendly stinkpotter.

Of course, the skipper is not sitting at the base of the mast, so you would have to visualize parallel lines from where you are. And if you should want to know when you've reached a lay-line without tacking over, you'd also have to make a 90° adjustment to your visualized parallel lines.

Does anyone else care to tell us how they know when they've reached a lay-line? Write in today! --ED.

OPPOSITE PAGE: Fred Tears (F/S 553) sent in this check list which he started using in 1964 as he thought it might be useful as a guide for new regatta-hoppers. Do you suppose he ever started off and forgot to pick up his crew or left the boat and trailer in the garage? You will note that Texas sailors don't need insect repellent or suntan lotion and that they have no need for binoculars, presumably because they never get far enough offshore or race a long enough leg to need them. We're sure the "Texas Flag" requirement won't receive universal acceptance; some surely will prefer the Confederate Flag, the Martini Burgee, or some other one closer to their hearts. What was that about a "Trapeze"? --ED.
