HOW THE EXPERTS DO IT

This column has a different twist this month. We thought it would be helpful to have an expert tell us how to get the most out of attending a Regatta.

Jack Beirwaltes of Fleet 3, Wilmette, Illinois is guest editor. Jack is a former FSSA President and Midwest Champion. We know from personal experience that Jack is a great competitor, true sportsman and perfect guest. We will do well to heed his words.

HOW TO BE A REGATTA WINNER by Jack Beirwaltes

Not all of us can be a Douglass, a Laird or a Schreck, but each of us can be a winner at the Regatta - any Regatta. Regattas are held for fun. Winning the sailboat race is only part of the fun. The fun starts months ahead when you're beginning to think about going - then deciding you will. Of course, you have no guarantee that your plans won't be disrupted, but that's no reason not to plan. Planning alone will greatly improve your chances of going and having all that excitement and fun. Once your plans are made, you start enjoying the pleasures of anticipation and coaxing your fleet mates to join you.

Sending your registration and reservations in early will make you a winner with your regatta hosts and assure you of the choicest accommodations. You won't have to be floundering around the last minute twisting arms, worrying about getting in at all, or staying at the most distant motel away from the Regatta crowd etc., etc.

Leaving a little early for the Regatta ought to get you there a little early too. Then you have time to get measured at your convenience, get the boat in, sail around the locale and become oriented to the course.

Even more important, you have the fun of leisurely visiting with other unhurried and unharried sailors - old friends from previous years or attractive new folks - who will be old friends in Regattas to come. This is the time for you to visit with your hosts and other natives about course peculiarities - winds, currents, lifts, knocks, etc. that the top sailors always seem to know about. You also have no trouble getting the race circulars - even getting to know some of the race committee members etc.

Once the racing starts, you're really relaxed and ready - you're free to think ahead how to best sail your race etc. By this time you know the lay of the land and sea, you understand the instructions in the skippers meeting - and you've already had a pleasant fun time. You've given yourself a real chance to sail your very best.

There is no such thing as a professional Regatta thrower - although some folks get pretty close to that. They're really all amateurs. Putting a Regatta together and carrying it off involves infinite details. The opportunity for things to go wrong are endless. If we dwell on the shortcomings of the Regatta and complain, we won't have nearly the fun we will if we preoccupy ourselves with its good points, and there are always plenty.

We've got to realize that our hosts have been preparing for this a long time and are working like fools to make it a good one. To be critical of their efforts or complain is certainly rank ingratitude - that spoils our fun - and theirs too. Very few people who have had the experience of putting on a Regatta will ever be heard to complain about someone else's.

On the course, we've got to roll with the "surprises". The race committee will most certainly do some things differently (and maybe better) than at home. Many times the race committee members are not the regulars of your hosts port - but they're always the race committee and we must make the best of it - if we don't it will cost us some fun.

If you volunteer a little help when you see arrangements nearly coming unglued, it will get you a new host friend and a pleasure which adds to the fun.

After the races are over, the winners are cheered and you pack up to go. To go around and warmly thank all of your new host-friends for knocking themselves out to assure you of a great time will send you on your way with a nice warm glow - at the Regatta you've been a real winner!

It will be remembered Paul McRoy finished last in the Mid-Winters'.


WELCOME FLEET 82

OFFICIAL NOTICE OF ANNUAL MEETING

The Annual Meeting of the Flying Scot Sailing Association will be held on Tuesday, August 18, 1970, at 8:00 p.m., at the Milwaukee Yacht Club, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, for the election of officers, consideration of a proposed amendment to the Constitution, and the conduct of such other business as may come before the meeting.

VOTING PROCEDURE

Each fleet is entitled to cast one vote for each Flying Scot enrolled in the fleet and recorded with the Association by an Active member in good standing. One vote is allowed per Active member. Fleets vote at the meeting either by personal delegate or by proxy. The delegate or proxy must be certified in writing by the fleet Secretary.

We hope that each fleet which will have participants in the regatta will certify one of its members as its delegate to vote on all matters. In order to be certain of a quorum, however, a form of proxy is being sent to each fleet Secretary, who is asked to cast the fleet's votes as instructed by its membership on the matters described below.

Ernest L. Godshalk, as immediate Past President, will serve as Commodore of the Association as provided in the Constitution.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO CONSTITUTION

The Bylaws have been amended to provide for a panel of Judges to have general supervision over the North American Championship. The Judges will be non-participants in the regatta, which will eliminate possible conflict of interest situations inherent in the prior procedure under which final decisions were made by the International Race Committee, most of whom compete in the regatta. It is appropriate that the Constitution now be amended to conform to the Bylaws and the recently adopted Sailing Instructions. Fleet 7 has proposed the appropriate amendments and they have been reviewed by the Amendments Committee and the Board of Governors and are recommended for adoption at the Annual Meeting.

The proposal is to amend Article XIII-2 (nature and function of the International Race Committee) of the Constitution by deleting everything after clause <u>b</u> and substituting the following:

- Appoint a Regatta Committee which shall conduct the North American Championship Series regatta.
- d. Appoint a panel of three or five Judges to have general supervision over the conduct of the regatta, hear and decide protests involving the interpretation of this Constitution, the Bylaws and the Specifications, determine all matters arising during the regatta not covered by the Bylaws or the Sailing Instructions and exercise such other duties with respect to the regatta

as shall be provided in the Bylaws or the Sailing Instructions, provided that no person participating as skipper or crew of any Flying Scot entered in the regatta shall be a Judge and at least one Judge shall be a member of the Association.

Neither the Governing Board nor the International Race Committee shall have power to reverse decisions of the panel of Judges. The International Race Committee and the panel of Judges shall become dissolved after all protests and other business of the regatta have been disposed of. Dissolution of the panel of Judges shall serve as a limitation against the introduction of any further evidence and shall guarantee the status quo of all decisions made while in session, unless permission is granted by the Judges to appeal to the N.A.Y.R.U. Otherwise, all decisions of the Judges rendered in accordance with provisions contained in this article and the Bylaws shall be considered final.

OTHER BUSINESS

The following fleet charters will be recommended for revocation for failure to maintain the required minimum membership:

Flt. 2 — Columbus, Ohio — O'Shaughnessy Reservoir

Flt. 55 — Wichita, Kansas — Cheney Reservoir

Flt. 62 - Lake Thomas, Texas - Lake Thomas

The charters of these three fleets were suspended by the Governing Board in August 1969.

CHICK LANPHIER REPORTS

Ed's note: The following was taken from a personal letter to Steve Fitts. We do not know the Regatta to which Chick refers - but we thought his report interesting.

... We were fortunate enough to win the last race on Sunday by a fantastic margin, (the closest boat was an M-20 seven minutes behind us) and took first place in a class of eight boats with a handicap under 95. It might interest you to know that in that race, with air varying to 1-6 know that we beat all of the Windmills and all but one of the Snipes that starrout five minutes ahead of us, all but four of the Y Flyers that started ten minutes ahead of us, all of the Skipjacks that started fifteen minutes ahead. Needless to say, I was very happy with our performance.

The race out to Dauphin Island Saturday was a 7 hour beat with 5-10 knots and 2 foot seas - a beautiful day - we didn't do well at all in a 20 boat Scot Fleet.

Sunday the only organized race was back to Fairhope, so we sailed to Buccaneer Y.C. where the car was. We started in 2-3 foot seas with maybe 12-15 knots - spinnaker and all - that only lasted one hour and my helmsman gave out - me too. The wind and waves built and we planed and plowed about another hour down the track (tacking dead down wind) the seas now 6-8 feet and 20-25 knots - we reefed (to batten) - in what we conservatively estimate as 8-10 foot rollers and 25-30 knots. We chugged into B.Y.C. exactly 3 hours after we left the Island Channel - scared, pooped, exhilarated and with story telling to last many nights - the small craft warnings were out - the outer causeway lane closed. How the boat took it I'll never know - mast looked like spaghetti when we plowed and the tiller likewise - but what a ride - we'll be back next year.
